On motion made by Mrs. Hilliard and seconded by Mr. Cheatham, Council would meet in closed session to discuss appointments to boards and commissions and the evaluation of the performance of an employee as permitted by Virginia Code Section 2.2-3711(A)(1). Introduction of New School Principals

Dr. Michelle Belle, Superintendent, introduced Mr. Rodney Barry as the new principal at J.P. King Middle School, and Lawrence Whiting as the new principal at Franklin High School.

Financial Matters

Brian Stump presented Council with Budget Amendments 2009-54 and 2009-55.

Legal Matters

Taylor Williams, City Attorney, advised Council of the status of the Hayden School cleanup. All of the records have been shredded and the scrap metal has all been removed. Various wood products are being used by the Fire Department at their training grounds. The schools have cleaned up the metal out buildings and the entire clean up project should be completed by early August.

SPSA Update – Mr. Cheatham advised Council and the public on the latest news from SPSA. The board is currently waiting to hear back from possible bids on the Waste to Energy plant, in which a public hearing will follow. The Re-Energy proposal has not been analyzed by staff yet. Mr. Cheatham reminded Council of the need to submit three names as his replacement on the board in January.

**Re-Appropriation of School Board Funds –
Resolution Appropriating \$253,212.17 in Excess Funds to the Franklin City School
Division**

WHEREAS, the Franklin City School Division received a rebate of funds in the amount of \$253,212.17 from the State on June 30, 2009, which funds are now excess funds because they were not spent or obligated in the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2009; and,

WHEREAS, the General Assembly passed special legislation that allows the Franklin City School Division to keep these excess funds from the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2009; and,

WHEREAS, the excess funds must be appropriated by the City to the School Division before the School Division will have access to the funds; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Franklin City Council does hereby appropriate the excess funds received by the School Division from the State on June 30, 2009, in the amount of \$253,212.17, to the Franklin City School Division to be used in its general fund as provided for in Chapter 781, 2009 Acts of Assembly for the fiscal year 2009/2010.

On motion made by Mrs. Hilliard and seconded by Mrs. Lawrence, the Resolution Re-Appropriating School Board Funds was unanimously approved by Council. **RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the City of Franklin has various bank accounts with SunTrust Bank, BB&T and Bank of America for the purpose of conducting business, depositing funds, holding funds and expending funds; and

WHEREAS, the City employee formerly designated as the person authorized to sign checks and deposit funds in the various accounts has retired from employment with the City; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the City to have a person or persons authorized to conduct business on the various bank accounts presently existing or possibly created in the future.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Franklin City Council designates June D. Fleming, City Manager and Edward A. Martin, Collection Clerk, either of whom may act, as persons authorized to sign checks, deposit funds and conduct business on the various bank accounts standing in the name of the City of Franklin and to execute any and all deposit account resolutions and authorizations and signature cards necessary and required by the various banks.

REFERENCE: Scenic River Designation of the Blackwater River

Background

The Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) recently conducted an evaluation of the Blackwater River from Proctor's Bridge, Route 621, to its confluence with the Nottoway River at the North Carolina line. On the basis of the field evaluation that was completed from March 25th and ending April 29, 2009, the segment of the Blackwater River from Route 621 to its confluence with the Nottoway River a total of 56 miles was found to qualify as a Virginia Scenic River.

In order to continue with the designation process the City of Franklin needs to pass a resolution of support requesting that the General Assembly of Virginia amend the Code of Virginia to include this 56 mile stretch of the Blackwater River as a component of the Virginia Scenic Rivers System.

The Virginia Scenic Rivers program began in 1970 with passage by the General Assembly of the Virginia State Scenic River Act (Code of Virginia; Title 10.1. Chapter 4 Sections 10.1-400 through 10.1-418). Since then, 20 river segments totaling approximately 474 miles have been designated state scenic rivers. The Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) administers the Virginia Scenic Rivers program and it is assisted and advised by the Scenic River Board. The intent of the Virginia Scenic Rivers program is to identify, recognize and provide a level of protection to those rivers whose scenic beauty, historic importance, recreational value and natural characteristics make them resources of particular importance. State designated scenic rivers possess these outstanding characteristics.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends the adoption of this resolution so that it may be forwarded to the Virginia General Assembly as well as the Department of Conservation and Recreation so that the Blackwater River may be considered a component of the Virginia Scenic Rivers System.



WHEREAS, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) conducted an evaluation of the Blackwater River from Proctor's Bridget, Route 621, to its confluence with the Nottoway River at the North Carolina line; and

WHEREAS, on the basis of the field evaluation that was completed from March 25th and ending April 29th 2009 a total of 56 miles was found to qualify as a Virginia Scenic River; and

WHEREAS, DCR staff along with local government representatives from Isle of Wight County, Southampton County, and the City of Franklin, as well as citizens paddled the entire Blackwater River study corridor during the field evaluation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Franklin is in support of the designation of the Blackwater River as a Scenic River;

10.1-418.8 Blackwater State Scenic River

The Blackwater River in Isle of Wight and Southampton Counties and the Cities of Franklin and Suffolk, from Proctor's Bridge at Route 621, to its confluence with the Nottoway River at the North Carolina line, a distance of approximately 56 miles, is hereby designated a component of the Virginia Scenic Rivers System. Nothing in this section shall preclude the Commonwealth or a local governing body from construction, reconstructing, or performing necessary maintenance on any road or bridge.

Dear Mr. Caskey, Mr. Johnson, Ms. Fleming and Ms. Cuffee-Glenn:

At your request, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) conducted an evaluation of the Blackwater River from Proctor's Bridge, Route 621, to its confluence with the Nottoway River at the North Carolina line. On the basis of the field evaluation that was completed over the course of several weeks beginning March 25 and ending April 29, 2009, the segment of the Blackwater River from Route 621 to its confluence with the Nottoway River, a total of 56 miles, was found to qualify as a Virginia Scenic River.

Background work began during the winter of 2009 and continued throughout the evaluation period. DCR staff, along with local government representatives and citizens, paddled the entire Blackwater River study corridor during the field evaluation. Those participating at various times during the fieldwork included staff from Isle of Wight County, Southampton County and the City of Franklin; the Blackwater-Nottoway Riverkeeper; representatives of The Nature Conservancy; citizens from all the involved jurisdictions, including adjacent landowners; representatives of the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries; and Bryon Carmean, a local citizen involved in the Champion Tree program, who served as a guide on most of the expeditions.

Should your localities wish to continue with the designation process, please notify me of your intention so DCR staff can prepare the necessary formal report. Also, the Isle of Wight County and the Southampton County Boards of Supervisors and the City Councils of Franklin and Suffolk will need to pass resolutions of support for the designation of the Blackwater River as described in the suggested legislation, which is attached.

Once resolutions are adopted, you will need to contact your local General Assembly representatives to request that they serve as patrons for the legislation that will codify the designation. Again, the attached draft amendment to the *Code of Virginia* should prove helpful.

The proposed river section was presented to the Virginia Scenic River Advisory Board at their meeting last month, and membership unanimously supported the endorsement for designation of the Blackwater River as described in the first paragraph of this letter and in the attached suggested legislation.



DRAFT Virginia Scenic Rivers System Legislation

A BILL to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Chapter 4 of Title 10.1 a section numbered § 10.1-418.8. , relating to Scenic Rivers.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 4 of Title 10.1 a section numbered 10.1-418.8 as follows:

§ 10.1-418.8. Blackwater State Scenic River.

The Blackwater River in Isle of Wight and Southampton Counties and the Cities of Franklin and Suffolk, from Proctor's Bridge at Route 621, to its confluence with the Nottoway River at the North Carolina line, a distance of approximately 56 miles, is hereby designated a component of the Virginia Scenic Rivers System. Nothing in this section shall preclude the Commonwealth or a local governing body from constructing, reconstructing, or performing necessary maintenance on any road or bridge.

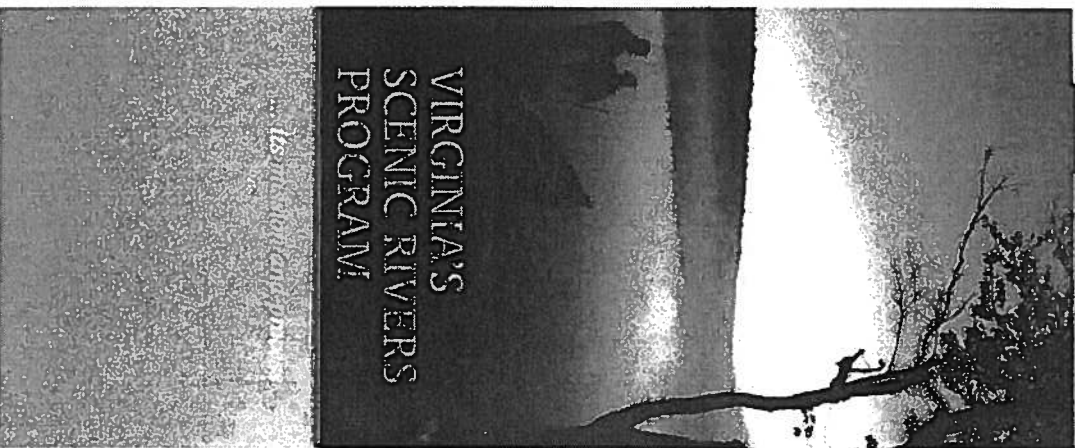
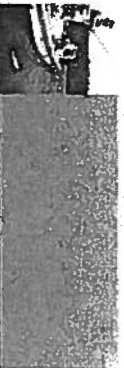

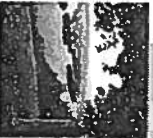
SCENIC RIVER DESIGNATION DOES NOT ...

- provide additional authorization to any state agency to condemn land or to acquire real property or interest therein for the purpose of providing additional access to the river. In fact, use of the power of eminent domain is specifically prohibited (section 10.1-405).
- impose any land use controls or regulations. Land use controls are the discretion of the locality. While DCR may assist in the development of river corridor protection measures, any such measures are implemented at the discretion of the local government (section 10.1-405).
- affect a riparian landowner's right to use the river or its banks for grazing, irrigation, hunting, fishing, etc. (section 10.1-408).
- bring any federal control, rules or regulations.



HISTORY

The Virginia Scenic Rivers program began in 1970 with passage by the General Assembly of the Virginia State Scenic River Act (Code of Virginia: Title 10.1, Chapter 4 Sections 10.1-400 through 10.1-418). Since then, 20 river segments totaling approximately 474 miles have been designated state scenic rivers. The Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) administers the Virginia Scenic Rivers program and it is assisted and advised by the Scenic River Board.



PROGRAM INTENT

The intent of the Virginia Scenic Rivers program is to identify, recognize and provide a level of protection to those rivers whose scenic beauty, historic importance, recreational value and natural characteristics make them resources of particular importance. State designated scenic rivers possess these outstanding characteristics.

STUDY REQUEST

Before a river or river segment can be designated, DCR staff must first study the waterway to determine if it qualifies for scenic

river status. Scenic river studies are usually initiated at the request of local governments. However, the General Assembly and state agencies can also request an evaluation.

EVALUATION PROCESS

Upon receiving a request, DCR conducts a river evaluation, beginning with an assessment that includes a map survey, related literature review and field study to validate existing land use or quality. A field evaluation is then conducted—staff, local residents and others canoe or boat the stretch of river and rate its characteristics. Each river or river segment is evaluated using 11 factors or criteria: these were established to provide a uniform gauge by which all waterways are measured. Some of the major factors include water quality, corridor development, historic features, natural features, visual appeal, quality of fisheries and the presence or habitat of unique species.

QUALIFICATION PROCESS

If a river qualifies, DCR staff then prepare a scenic river report describing the waterway. The report includes resolutions of support from local governments and comments from state agencies. The report also serves as a multi-purpose planning document for future stewardship of the river. The final step is passage by the General Assembly of a bill designating the waterway a state scenic river.



ADMINISTERING AGENCY

As the administering agency for the Virginia Scenic Rivers program, DCR periodically assesses conditions along each scenic river segment. DCR prepares comments on projects that may impact a designated scenic river. DCR also serves as the support agency for the program's advisory board, informing the board on issues related to the Virginia Scenic Rivers program.

VIRGINIA SCENIC RIVER BOARD

The Scenic River Act establishes a governor appointed 15-member citizen advisory board that includes riparian landowners and other citizens from throughout Virginia. The board's purpose is to promote citizen stewardship of scenic rivers and to assist and advise DCR and local governments concerning protection and management of scenic rivers.

VIRGINIA SCENIC RIVER DESIGNATION DOES ...

- ✓ require the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to consider the impact of proposed hydropower or related projects on a designated scenic river using the scenic river report developed in the qualification process.
- ✓ require all state agencies to consider the visual, natural and recreational values of a scenic river in their planning and permitting process (section 10.1-402).
- ✓ give riparian landowners, local citizens and local governments a greater voice in the planning and implementation of federal and state projects that might affect the river (section 10.1-406).
- ✓ require authorization by the General Assembly for the construction, operation and/or maintenance of a dam, or similar structure, that will impede the natural flow of the river (section 10.1-407).
- ✓ allow riparian landowners to continue using their land as they did before designation, except for the section 10.1-407 provision (section 10.1-408).

Attached Council will find a memo to Chief Hardison from Deputy Chief Edwards recommending that the City of Franklin Police Department apply for a USDA Rural Development Grant. Chief Hardison has approved the recommendation and discussed it with me.

To qualify for this grant there are a few requirements which have to be met. One of those requirements is the 45% local match. This match requirement is met by demonstrating to the granting agency that funds equal to the 45% requirement are in the approved 2009-2010 budget. It does not require that those budgeted funds be reappropriated to the grant, nor does it require that those funds be spent for any item(s) other than those already approved. The match requirement may be interpreted to be an indication of support in the current police department budget. Those budgeted items which will be used as match are budget items which meet the qualifications of the grant.

The second requirement that must be met to file for the grant is that the Council review the grant request in a public meeting. The discussion of this item at a City Council meeting meets that requirement. No official action of the Council is needed at this time.

I have reviewed the grant application, approved the items the grant funds would be used for if the grant is approved and I am forwarding the grant application to the Council for discussion. If Council has any questions, Chief Hardison and Deputy Chief Edwards will be available at the meeting to answer your concerns.

The Police Department continues in its aggressive pursuit of grants and other financial assistance in an effort to secure funding for items which enable the department to operate as an effective organization while reducing the financial impact on the City's resources. The department is diligent in seeking out additional financial assistance which has no negative financial impact on the City of Franklin. The Police Department, under the leadership of Chief Hardison and particularly the efforts of Deputy Chief Edwards, are to be commended.

I met with Peggy Jordan of the USDA Rural Development to discuss their community programs grant. Under this program we are eligible for a grant with 55% federal funding¹ and 45% local match. The total project would be \$90,900. The match portion of this grant may be borrowed from Rural Development or we can provide the match from the approved budget. My proposal is to use items we planned to purchase in this year's budget as our match.²

The funds would be used to purchase police vehicles and equipment. All are allowed under this program.

Rural Development has funds available in two of its Community Programs Grant areas. One fund is stimulus money the other is its regular funding budget.

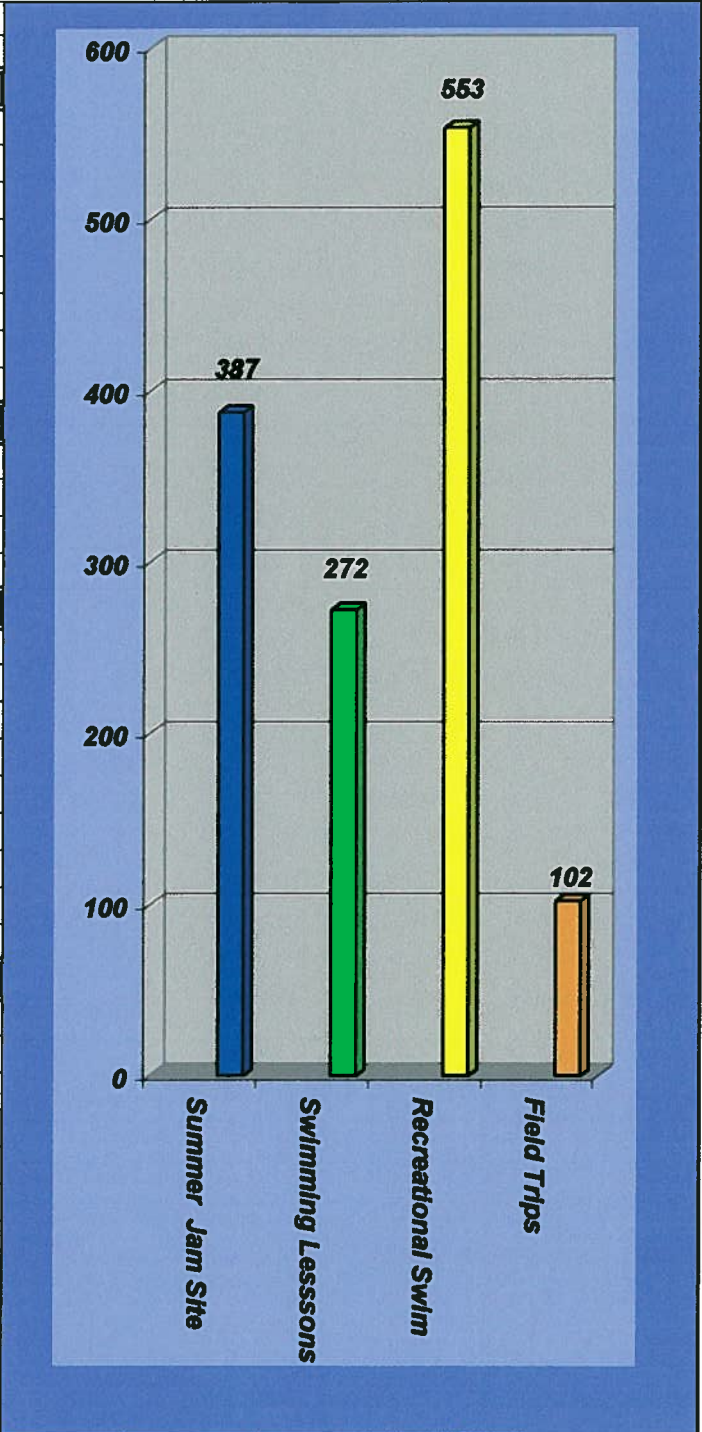

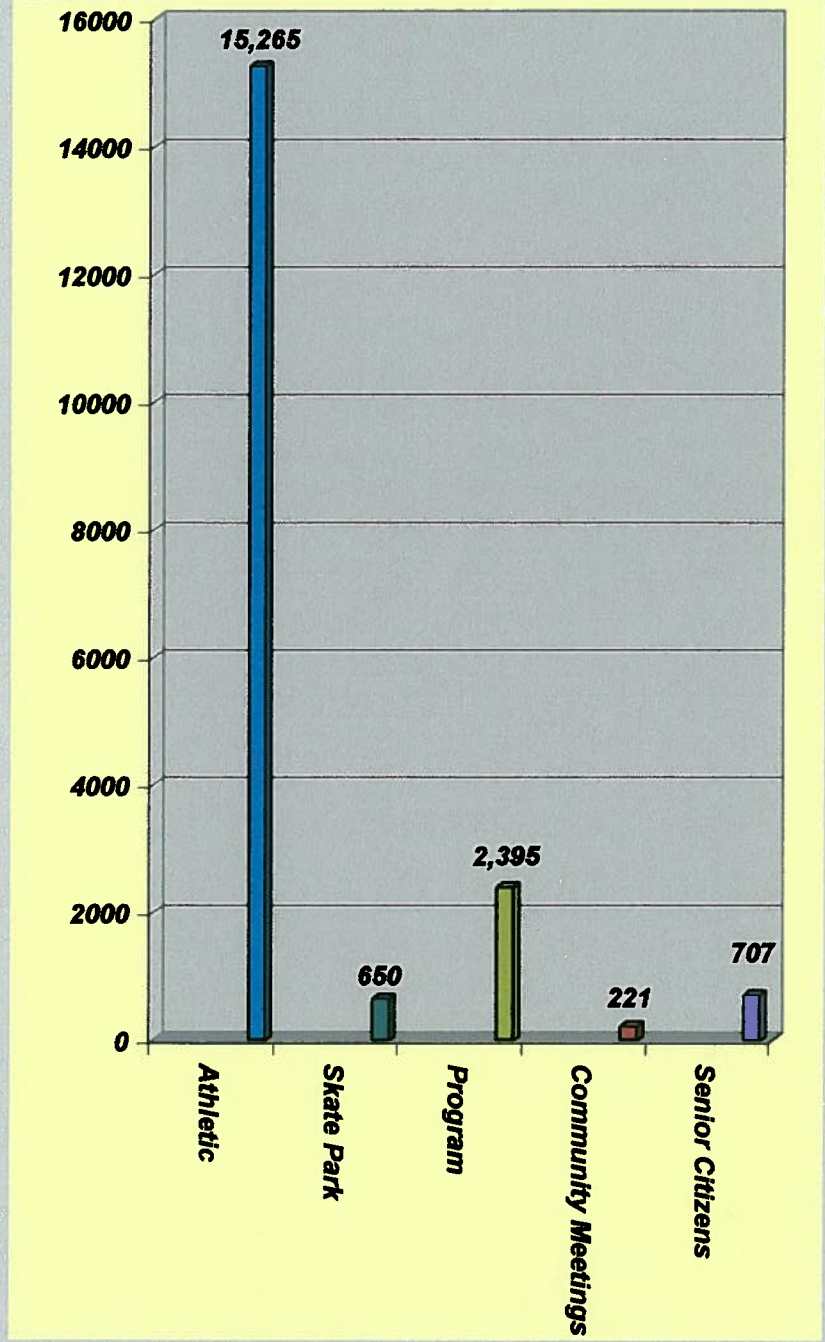
