



#### MINUTES FROM THE JANUARY 10, 2022 REDISTRICTING WORK SESSION

The Franklin City Council held a Regular City Council Meeting on January 10, 2022 at 7:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 207 West Second Avenue, Franklin, Virginia 23851.

Council Members in Attendance: Frank Rabil, Mayor; Robert (Bobby) Cutchins, Vice-Mayor; Councilman Linwood Johnson; Councilwoman Wynndolyn Copeland; Councilman Ray Smith and Councilman Gregory McLemore

Council Members Arriving Later: Councilman Mark R. Kitchen arrived at 6:21 p.m.

**Staff in Attendance:** Amanda Jarratt, City Manager and Leesa Barnes, Executive Assistant, recording minutes.

#### Call to Order

Mayor Frank Rabil called the Redistricting Work Session to order at 6:00 p.m. He then turned the floor over to Amanda Jarratt, City Manager to review the following:

#### **Redistricting Map Proposals**

City Manager Jarratt stated that every ten years after the U. S. Census is conducted redistricting must occur for the six existing wards. Staff has worked with the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission to prepare two options for City Council's consideration. Staff was guided by the following requirements for drawing new boundaries:

- A requirement that the 2020 Census date be used to determine the number of residents to be included in each district as new boundaries are drawn.
- A requirement that boundaries count not be drawn that would deviate from the ideal number of residents in a district by more than 5% or by less than 5%.
- A requirement that boundaries be drawn so as to be compact and contiguous.
- A requirement that boundaries be based on clearly defined and identifiable lines.
- A requirement that boundaries should not change the racial demographics of the City.

In the 2020 Census the population losses were in Ward 4 and Ward 5. Two options are being presented for City Council to review and discuss prior to the scheduling of public feedback opportunities. It is important to note, that in both Options A and B the City of Franklin maintains three majority minority districts as is the current scenario under the 2010 final districts.

#### City Council Salaries

City Manager Amanda Jarratt stated several City Council members have recently inquired about increasing their salaries. The current salaries in the City of Franklin are as follows:

Mayor \$10,437.00

Vice-Mayor \$ 8,491.00

Council \$ 7,896.00

Section 15.2-1414.6 of the Code of Virginia regulates the salaries of elected officials by population. The limit for the City of Franklin is as follows:

Mayor \$11,500.00

Council \$11,000.00

The statute further dictates that no increase in the salary of a member of Council shall take effect until July 1, 2022 after the next regularly scheduled general election of Council members. Every proposed increase in the salary of a member of council shall be adopted at least four months prior to the date of the next municipal election except in the case of a newly created consolidated city when the proposed increase shall be adopted at least two months prior to the date of its municipal election.

Councilman Gregory McLemore stated that Mayor Frank Rabil's salary is \$3,000.00 more than the rest of City Council. In other municipalities it is never more than \$500.00 difference. Councilman McLemore requested that the salaries be leveled out.

Mayor Frank Rabil stated that no one serving on City Council took the oath of City Council for the salary, we took the oath to serve our community. Mayor Rabil stated that he would reduce his salary within \$500.00 of City Council's salary. He expressed that this topic needed to be discussed during budget sessions. Mayor Frank Rabil proposed that the topic of salaries be discussed during budget session.

Councilman McLemore requested a work session to discuss City Council salaries.

Mayor Rabil stated that is what he meant when he said to discuss salaries during budget sessions.

Councilman McLemore stated what would be the need if all of City Council was not in agreement to increase their salaries.

Mayor Rabil requested that Councilman McLemore make a motion.

Councilman Gregory McLemore made a motion to increase City Council's salaries. The motion was seconded by Councilman Linwood Johnson.

VDOE Announces \$12 Million

in School Security Equipment Grants

RICHMOND — The Virginia Department of Education today announced \$12 million in state School Security Equipment Grants to protect students, faculty and visitors in 583 schools in 93 school divisions. The grants will pay for video monitoring systems, voice and video internal communications systems, school bus interior cameras, mass notification systems, visitor-identification systems, access control systems, two-way radios, security vestibules and other security upgrades.

"The health and safety of students and school staff is paramount," said Superintendent of Public Instruction James Lane. "These grants are an important part of equipping schools with the systems necessary to mitigate security risks, detect threats and connect schools with first responders. The commonwealth continues to lead the nation in proactively addressing school safety as VDOE works in partnership with other state agencies and local school divisions to keep students, faculty and visitors safe in our schools."

The criteria for making the awards — developed by VDOE and the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services — give priority to schools most in need of modern security equipment, schools with relatively high numbers of offenses, schools with equipment needs identified by a school security audit, and schools in divisions least able to afford security upgrades. The divisions awarded grants are as follows:

Franklin — \$192,000 for Franklin High, Joseph P. King Jr. Middle and S.P. Morton Elementary.

A local match of 25 percent is required of most divisions. Three school divisions with composite indices of local-ability-to-pay of less than 0.2 — Buena Vista, Lee County and Scott County — are exempt from the local-match requirement.

The 2019 Appropriation Act doubled the total annual appropriation for the grant program — effective in 2020 — from \$6 million, to \$12 million. The 2019 General Assembly also approved Governor Ralph Northam's proposal to increase the maximum award per school division — also effective in 2020 — from \$100,000, to \$250,000.

The School Security Equipment Grants program was established by the 2013 General Assembly in the aftermath of the 2012 mass shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary in Newtown, Connecticut.

Note to city: A grant like this just pops up out of nowhere. If we want this grant we have to reallocate dollars from somewhere, to Operations and Maintenance to cover the local match.

Local match requirement = \$48,000



## DECLARATION OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY ON JANUARY 20, 2022 BY THE CITY OF FRANKLIN, VIRGINIA DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES

Whereas, The Director of Emergency Services of the City of Franklin, Virginia does hereby find as follows:

- 1. That due to occurrence of an impending winter storm the City of Franklin is facing a condition of extreme peril to the lives, safety, and property of the residents of the City of Franklin;
- 2. The City of Franklin is expecting to receive between 4 6 inches of snow and sustained temperatures below 32 degrees over the next twenty-four hours.
- 3. That as a result of this extreme peril, the proclamation of the existence of an emergency is necessary to permit the full powers of government to deal effectively with this condition of peril.

**Now, Therefore,** be it proclaimed and ordered that during the existence of this emergency the powers, functions, and duties of the Director of Emergency Management and the Emergency Services organization and functions of the City of Franklin shall be those prescribed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia and the ordinances, resolutions, and approved plans;

In order to carry out the effect of this resolution, the City Manager Amanda C. Jarratt or the Director of Finance, Tracy Spence and their designees, are hereby authorized to expend funds form the City's unappropriated fund balance to cover the reasonable operations costs of emergency services pending further report to Franklin City Council and such additional appropriations as shall be deemed necessary to cover the expected scope of this emergency and ratified by City Council.

**Now, Therefore;** I Amanda C. Jarratt, Director of Emergency Services, for the City of Franklin Virginia do hereby proclaim and declare that a local emergency exists in the City of Franklin, Virginia, effective on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of January 2022.
