Commonwealth of Virginia State Board of Social Services Child Welfare Workforce Month September 2022 Resolution of Recognition #2022-23

WHEREAS, the State Board of Social Services recognizes the investment and commitment of Virginia's public child welfare workforce-local departments of social services' Family Services Specialists and Supervisors- toward preserving safety, supporting permanency and increasing well-being of children and families; and who, during State Fiscal Year 2021, handled over 30,223 completed Child Protective Services referrals, supported 4,064 active In-Home cases, transferred custody of 420 children and youth to relatives, placed 508 children and youth in kinship homes, achieved the reunification of 658 children and youth, and the adoption of 845 children and youth from foster care;

WHEREAS, the child welfare workforce experiences high exposure to secondary trauma in the course of performing daily job duties and responsibilities, requiring support to address vicarious trauma, recognition for their successes, realistic ways to maintain work-life balance, and agency climate and culture that promotes retention and best practice;

WHEREAS, local departments of social services play an integral role in supporting Virginia's child welfare workforce, in partnership with state and local partners, communities and jurisdictions;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, on this 12th day of September, I, Frank Rabil, Mayor of the City of Franklin do hereby recognize September 2022 as Child Welfare Workforce Month; and,

Old/New Business:

A. Gold Star Veterans

City Manager Amanda Jarratt stated the Gold Star Veteran bill is a follow up from the previous meeting. This bill was adopted by the General Assembly in April 2022, it allows spouses of those who served in the military that were killed in the active duty. This determination was made by the U.S. Department of Defense and that individual must reside in the real property and does not remarry. Localities are now able to adopt an ordinance that gives them relief. This is slightly different than what the City can do for the disabled veterans, which is a sliding scale, this requires the Council to set a rate. If Council decides to move forward there will be two actions to take. (1) Adopting the ordinance that becomes a part of the City Code which allows this to exist and (2) the rate at which the Council will tax the real property. It may not be \$0.00 (zero), it may be as low as \$0.01, and the current real estate tax rate is \$1.03. The City currently has one resident that qualifies as a gold star veteran spouse. The ordinance was drafted straight from the State Code section.

Councilman Gregory McLemore made a motion to approve the Gold Star Veteran Ordinance 2022-03 with a second from Councilman Linwood Johnson.

Councilman Ray Smith asked what would be the estimated number of people that this may affect. City Manager Amanda Jarratt stated that right now the City is aware of one. The criteria are very specific because we are a heavy military region. From a longer budgetary perspective the Council may need to take that into account in the future.

RESOLUTION #2022-24 TO APPROVE TAX RATE PURSUANT TO § 27-64-11 OF THE CITY CODE

WHEREAS, pursuant to Division 5, Article II, Chapter 27 of the Code of the City of Franklin, Virginia, residential real property owned and occupied by a surviving spouse of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States who died in the line of duty meeting the requirements of the division is declared to be a separate class of property and constitute a classification for City taxation separate from other classifications of real property; and

WHEREAS, such real property is required to be tax at the rate levied by City Council for such class of property, which rate shall not be zero and shall not exceed that applicable to the general class of real property.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED**, the City Council does hereby establish that residential real property owned and occupied by a surviving spouse meeting the requirements of Division 5, Article II, Chapter 27 of the Code of the City of Franklin, Virginia shall be taxed at the rate of:

B. City Managers Report

City Manager Amanda Jarratt wanted to notify Council of the unfortunate news of Dallas Jones, Chairman of the Southampton County Board of Supervisor passed away. Many of the Council has worked alongside Mr. Jones for many years, he was the definition of a public servant.

The City recently had a review with one of the insurance policies with VRSA, and the City currently does not have an agreement Franklin City Public School regarding the parking of their school buses on the City property, which is a huge issues for both entities. If anything is to happen to the buses while on the City property, we need to make sure that everyone involved is covered properly from an insurance perspective. VRSA provided the City an example Memorandum of Understanding to enter into with the school system. It has been reviewed by legal and it has been shared with the Superintendent. The plan is to put this item on the September 26th agenda and the Superintendent will put on the following school board agenda, to ensure that everyone involved is covered. It's a time sensitive issues which the City needs to act on as quickly as possible.

Councilman Linwood Johnson asked if that would be on the City policy or the School Board policy. City Manager Amanda Jarratt stated that it is a hold harmless, if something happens to the buses, the school board will file under their insurance and vice versa if the buses damage City property. It holds everyone harmless.

City Manager Amanda Jarratt stated the City is working on a number of the capital projects, the City closed on financing today and drew down the first amount of money, which would be for the school roof project. The Superintendent will provide a timeline on when the projects will start.

- Staff continues to work with DHCD and Summit Engineering on the Laurel Street CBDG Grant. Client intake and income verifications have begun.
- We received three proposals for the City of Franklin Transit Feasibility Study. Staff is in the process of working DRPT to score the proposals.
- Staff continues to meet with regional partners to discuss next steps on the regional radio system as well as violence and crime prevention.
- The City of Franklin collected18 units of blood in the Mayor's Cup Blood Drive coming in third place. The next blood drive is scheduled for September 19th at the Franklin Business Center.















FY22 Water & Sewer Fund Budget vs. Actual










How Much of the City's FY22 Water & Sewer Fund's Revenues covered Expenses?







FY22 Solid Waste Fund Budget vs. Actual










How Much of the City's FY22 Solid Waste Fund's Revenues covered Expenses?


FY22 Electric Fund Budget vs. Actual



Re: FY22 Carryover Request

Dear Mrs. Jarratt,

Franklin Fire & Rescue would like to formally request items listed below for carryover from FY22 budget to the current FY23 budget.

Over the last fiscal year we have been working to renovate the Emergency Services Building that was constructed in 1979 and was remodeled after the flood of 2001. Our Firefighters have conducted much of the remodel themselves in between answering calls for service and their yearly ISO training requirements. This is a big savings to the City, but there are additional items that we need to finish. We are requesting the remaining funds as a carryover to finish the renovation project in the amount of \$65,000.

Additionally, we would like to continue with our sustainability program by moving remaining unused funds that pertain to our EMS billing and contract to the Department's fund balance. The fund balance was created to assist with our capital needs while taking the burden off the City and its citizens. Due to inflation and supply chain issues, manufacturers have increased their apparatus cost substantially and maintaining a sustainable funding program will be a key moving forward. We request \$200,000.00 of remaining FY22 funds to be moved in the Fire Department fund balance.

Over the last several years the City has received federal relief funds which Council has approved for the Departments to purchase disaster response trailers and upgrades to key facilities that will be used in the event of a disaster. We have completed shower upgrades at the Armory Field House, but we are still trying to determine an affordable alternative power source. We are working with an electrical contractor to identify our options. I am requesting the remaining funds from this project in the amount of \$37,889.00. Additionally, the disaster response trailers we have purchased are sitting outside enduring the elements of the weather. These trailers are very expensive and need to be housed under a shelter to maximize their life. I am requesting carryover funds to purchase an enclosed shed large enough to house our response trailers in the amount of \$50,000.00.

Lastly, our Department is in need of replacing the remaining 10 Survive Air Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). These packs are no longer serviceable and are certified to the 2002 NFPA standard. The packs are not compatible with our current SCBAs which poses a significant safety risk. Currently, we are operating under the 2018 NFPA standard. I am requesting carryover funds to replacement the remaining SCBAs in the amount of \$95,000.00

I would like to thank you in advance for considering our proposal request for FY22 carryover.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Franklin, Virginia ("City Council") has committed to the expenditure of certain funds for fire and emergency medical services in the City of Franklin; and

Background Information

The City of Franklin, Southampton County, and Isle of Wight County have shared a joint Enterprise Zone since 2011. Isle of Wight county has 2,438 acres within its three subzones and has the capability of expanding these subzones to include as many as 1,402 acres. As a result of the joint Enterprise Zone the City Manager's signature is required on the expansion application. The Franklin Regional Airport remaining property is proposed to be included in the Camptown Subzone expansion. Mr. Keaton's letter outlines their request in greater detail.

Needed Action

Authorize the City Manager to sign the expansion application for the Isle of Wight County Enterprise Zones expansion.

Dear Ms. Jarratt:

Isle of Wight County has been a proud partner in our joint Enterprise Zone with the City of Franklin and Southampton County since 2011. The County has 2,438 acres within its three strategically-located subzones and has the capability of expanding these subzones to include as many as 1,402 more acres.

Together we've experienced more than a decade of success across our respective jurisdictions in attracting new businesses and expansions into Enterprise Zones. Isle of Wight's subzones have leveraged over \$320 million in capital investment and have sustained thousands of jobs, and the County desires to significantly expand two subzones to create more opportunities that will bring jobs and investments. The County proposes to preserve the same incentive opportunities that already exist in all its subzones (enclosed) to attract investments and job creation in the proposed expansion.

Background

Over the last year, our Economic Development Department has been in consultation with the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) and FSEDI staff to ensure good communication and coordination prior to making an application for an expansion these subzones this fall. DHCD's application package requires two documents, signed by the chief administrative officer of the jurisdiction, to demonstrate that the joint-zone localities support the other member's desire to change their zone(s).

These are the "Local Assurances" and the "Joint Zone Amendment Agreement" documents (both enclosed). Isle of Wight County is required to hold a public hearing, but there is no requirement to inform property owners of expansion plans, nor for your jurisdiction to hold a public hearing or enact a resolution, etc., to endorse these expansions.

Camptown Subzone Expansion

The existing 335-acre Camptown Subzone, which is adjacent to the City of Franklin's subzone, includes the International Paper campus and other important industrial properties. Isle of Wight would like to expand this

subzone by over 518 acres, taking in properties such as the former Airway Shopping Center, Franklin Regional Airport and the nearly 60 acres that comprise the Industrial Air Park adjacent to the airport. The expanded subzone has been drawn in consultation with FSEDI staff and includes properties that are either currently or have the potential to be zoned commercial/industrial, but excludes residentially-zoned property or property that will likely remain agricultural over the long term. Importantly, both the existing and the proposed subzone expansion are fully within the Revenue Sharing District.

Windsor Subzone 1 Expansion

The existing 411-acre Windsor Subzone, which covers the entirety of Phase II of the Shirley T. Holland Intermodal Park, includes the Keurig Dr. Pepper and Safco facilities. Isle of Wight would like to expand this subzone by over 151 acres, taking in three (3) parcels in their entirety and one property, owned by the County's Economic Development Authority (EDA), partially. On advice from DHCD, because this EDA property (54-01-086J) has approximately 62.5 acres deemed "developable" due to environmental conditions, the county will be submitting only the 62.5 developable acres as part of the proposed subzone expansion. This helps maximize the remainder acreage allotted to the county for future expansions in any of the subzones.

The Windsor Subzone Expansion has been drawn to include properties that are desirable, large tracts potentially capable of holding larger-scale light industrial developments in response to the current market demand and diminishing supply of similar properties, especially with such excellent transportation access.

Isle of Wight County Public Hearing on the Expansions

DHCD has requested an earlier-than-typical application this year in light of their workload and the number of applications expected this year, and we are striving to accommodate that request. The Isle of Wight County Board of Supervisors is scheduled to hold a public hearing at its regular meeting on Thursday, October 20, 2022, and adopt a resolution that authorizes application for the expansions with DHCD. This date is reflected on the documents mentioned above which require your signature upon the County's expected action in October. Please feel free to use this letter and background information to inform your City Council at its scheduled meeting on September 26, 2022. THE VIRGINIA ENTERPRISE ZONE



The Virginia Enterprise Zone (VEZ) program is a partnership between state and local government that encourages job creation and private investment. VEZ accomplishes this by designating Enterprise Zones throughout the state and providing two grant-based incentives, the Job Creation Grant (JCG) and the Real Property Investment Grant (RPIG), to qualified investors and job creators within those zones, while the locality can also provide local incentives.

The RPIG is based on qualified investments made to commercial, industrial, and mixed-use buildings located within the boundaries of an Enterprise Zone. Grants are available for up to 20% of the real qualified property investment.

BENEFITS

Up to \$100,000 per building or facility for qualifying real property investments of less than \$5 million

Up to \$200,000 per building or facility for qualifying real property investments of \$5 million or more

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Commercial, industrial, or mixeduse buildings or facilities

For rehabilitation and expansion, at least \$100,000 incurred in qualified real property investments

For new construction, at least \$500,000 incurred in qualified real property investments

The JCG is based on permanent full-time job creation over a 4 job threshold, with wage rates at least 175 percent of the Federal minimum wage and availability of health insurance.

BENEFITS

Up to \$500/year per net new permanent, full-time position earning at least 175% of the Federal minimum wage with health benefits

Up to \$800/year per net new permanent full-time position earning at least 200% of federal minimum wage with health benefits

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Net new permanent full-time positions, created over the fourjob threshold, that meet wage and health benefit requirements

Excludes retail, personal service, or food and beverage positions

THE VIRGINIA ENTERPRISE ZONE



Isle of Wight County has approximately 2,438 designated acres of enterprise zone, including Shirley T. Holland Intermodal Park Phases II and III and the Camptown area adjacent to the City of Franklin. Along with the state incentives, Isle of Wight offers the following benefits for investments made within the enterprise zones.

MACHINERY & TOOLS TAX REBATE

Receive a 25% rebate on machinery & tools taxes paid for a period of five years for new businesses or expansions that invest \$1 million or more in new machinery and tools.

JOB CREATION GRANT

Receive \$500 per new full-time equivalent positions (requiring minimum of 35 hours worked per week) up to a maximum of 20 positions a year. Businesses must pay 150% of the federal minimum wage or \$10.88 to receive grants.

WAIVER OF PLAN REVIEW FEES

Waivers include site plan, subdivision and zoning permit fees for new businesses or expansions in one of the County's Enterprise Subzones.

FAST TRACK PERMITTING PROCESS

status during Receive high priority development review. including the resubmission of plans. early land disturbing permits, and footing and foundation permits prior to receiving final approval for new businesses plan or expansions that invest \$1 million or more in new machinery and tools or \$500,000 or more in business personal property.





Reference: Bus Parking Memorandum of Understanding

Background Information

After a recent review of our insurance policies VRSA brought to our attention that there was no formal agreement between the City of Franklin and Franklin City Public Schools regarding the parking of buses on City property. This could create a serious issue for both entities if something catastrophic should happen. They suggested the attached MOU be executed by both parties to provide us protection. Once approved by Council we will forward to Franklin City Public Schools for adoption.

Needed Action

Authorize execution of the Memorandum of Understanding and allow management to forward to Franklin City Public Schools for execution.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN

City of Franklin, Virginia

AND

The School Board of the City of Franklin, Virginia

This memorandum of understanding (MOU or Agreement) dated the ______ of September, 2022, is between the City of Franklin, Virginia (the City) and the School Board of the City of Franklin, Virginia (Franklin City Public Schools or FCPS) in furtherance of their joint goal to support the education and safe transportation of students enrolled in Franklin City Public Schools.

1. Use of City Premises.

The City will permit buses owned, used and/or maintained by Franklin City Public Schools to use certain parking areas on City property located at 1050 Pretlow Street Franklin, Virginia 23851 (City Premises). FCPS shall use only the designated areas as more fully described at Attachment A.

2. Prohibited Uses.

FCPS covenants that it will do nothing in its use of the City Premises or allow anything to be done or any substance to be kept on said premises which would operate to increase the fire hazard. FCPS further covenants that no waste or damage shall be committed upon or to the City Premises, that the City Premises shall be used for the purposes hereinabove stated, and shall not be used or permitted to be used for any other purpose, that the City Premises shall not be used for any unlawful purpose and no violations of law or ordinance shall be committed thereon, and that no advertisement or notice will be affixed to any part of the building without the consent of the City.

3. Insurance

Franklin City Public Schools agrees it shall secure and maintain a policy of liability and property damage insurance covering all buses parked on City. The policy shall be issued by an insurance carrier authorized to transact business in this Commonwealth. FCPS will further fulfill any additional requirements related to insurance and property damage coverage as required by Virginia Code §§ 22.1-188 through 22.1-198, § 46.2-472, and § 38.2-2206.

The City will maintain coverage sufficient to remediate any damage to the land located at 1050 Pretlow Street Franklin, Virginia 23851 as well as the value of the full replacement cost of any improvements thereto and any personal property owned by the City that is on the City Premises.

Each party will also maintain workers' compensation coverage through an insurer licensed to conduct business in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The coverage secured shall be in compliance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Both parties agree to comply at all times with any recommendations of their insurance companies arising out of or relating to FCPS's use of the City Premises and to pay for any and all expenses arising out of compliance with such recommendations.

4. Damage to City Premises / Hold Harmless.

The FCPS agrees to be responsible for any damage to the City Premises which may result from its use of the City Premises or any act done thereon by FCPS or any of its agents or employees person coming or being on the City Premises, unless resulting from the City's willful wrongful act or omission or the negligence or wrongdoing of a third-party.

5. Not Legally Binding.

This agreement is not intended to be a legally binding document. It is meant to describe the nature and to suggest the guidelines of the cooperation described above. Nothing therefore shall diminish the full autonomy of either institution, nor will any constraints be imposed by either upon the other in carrying out the agreement.

6. Effective Date.

The agreement shall become effective on the day representatives of both parties affix their signatures, will be in force for a period of five (5) years, and is subject to revision or modification by mutual written agreement. It is also understood that either institution may terminate the agreement at any time, although is assumed that such action would only be taken after mutual consultation in order to avoid any possible inconvenience to the other institution.

7. Designated Liaisons.

Both parties shall designate a contact person to serve as a liaison to the other party during the term of this agreement. Accordingly on or before [date], each party will supply to the other the contact person's name, address, and email address.

8. Counterparts.

This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts and all of such counterparts shall together constitute one and the same instrument. Original signatures transmitted and received via facsimile or other electronic transmission, (e.g., PDF or similar format) are true and valid signatures for all purposes hereunder and shall be effective as delivery of a manually executed original counterparts.

9. Entire Understanding

This Memorandum contains the entire understanding of the parties as to the matters contained herein, and it shall not be altered, amended or modified except by a writing executed by the duly authorized officials of both the City and the FCPS.
